Al in Special Education: Striking the Balance Between Innovation and Ethics

Generative AI technologies are becoming increasingly more popular in education, with more than half of U.S. teachers and K-12 students reporting using ChatGPT weekly in a recent study. This presentation explores how and why to bring AI into Special Education and the practical and ethical considerations (e.g., data privacy, AI bias, misinformation, digital divide) of doing so. Participants will leave the session with a deeper understanding of generative AI technologies and their impact on teaching and learning in the 21st century.

Torrey Trust, Ph.D. is a Professor of Learning Technology in the College of Education at the University of Massachusetts Amherst. From the Juvenile Justice Lens

School to Prison Pipeline and Special Education: The Massachusetts Data and Students With Disabilities : A Proactive Approach to Meeting Student Needs

This presentation will focus on the effects of the disproportionate use of school disciplinary exclusion and school based arrests leading to negative outcomes for students. The presentation will highlight the impact on students with disabilities and how the most vulnerable students enter the juvenile justice system in Massachusetts and address the role of trauma, how it manifests in classrooms and how the lack of traumaresponsive services, that address root causes of behavior, can lead to criminalizing young people for conduct that is, at its core, a treatment issue.

The presentation will culminate with a look at best practices being successfully employed in other jurisdictions across the country to address student needs while ensuring safe and supportive learning environments. It will provide strategies and techniques that are strength based for school teams to consider in addressing juvenile justice needs of students. The session will also provide a discussion on the proactive use of treatment for student behavior while ensuring the safe and supportive learning environments.
